

Clare Breidenich

Clare Breidenich is an independent consultant with over 14 years experience on climate change policy. From 2002 to 2006, Clare worked at the UNFCCC secretariat, where she managed the review of greenhouse gas inventories of Annex I Countries, and served as the lead officer for negotiations or reporting and review under the Convention and the Kyoto Protocol. Clare was instrumental in the development of the secretariat's procedures and data systems to support the Kyoto Protocol's reporting, review and compliance requirements.

Prior to joining the UNFCCC, Clare worked at the U.S. Department of State where she served as the lead negotiator for issues related to reporting and review processes, and accounting of emissions and emission allowances. Clare has also worked on international climate issues with the EPA's Office of Policy, Planning and Evaluation and Clean Air Markets Division.

Clare currently advises several organizations on the efforts of California and several Western states to develop an emissions trading system. In 2008, she served as a member of the Washington State Governor's Advisory Panel and the Forest Sector Working. Clare is currently participating in a National Academy of Sciences study assessing methods to monitor greenhouse gas emissions for treaty compliance.

Dan Bodansky, University of Georgia School of Law

Daniel M. Bodansky is associate dean for faculty development and serves as the Emily and Ernest Woodruff Chair in International Law at the University of Georgia. He is currently a visiting fellow at the Smith School of Enterprise and Environment at the University of Oxford through June 2009.

From 1989 to 2002, Bodansky was a faculty member of the University of Washington School of Law. He has served as the climate change coordinator and attorney-advisor at the U.S. Department of State, in addition to consulting for the United Nations in the areas of climate change and tobacco control. He has taught as an adjunct professor at the George Washington School of Law and the Georgetown University Law Center.

His scholarship includes two books, 24 scholarly articles and book chapters, five book reviews and more than 40 papers and presentations. Bodansky earned his Juris Doctor from Yale University where he was a member of the *Yale Law Journal*. He obtained his master's in the history and philosophy of science from Cambridge University in 1981 and his bachelor's *magna cum laude* from Harvard University in 1979.

He is the recipient of a Council on Foreign Relations International Affairs Fellowship, a Pew Faculty Fellowship in International Affairs and a Jean Monnet Fellowship from the European University Institute in Florence.

Bodansky currently serves on the board of editors of the *American Journal of International Law* and is the U.S.-nominated arbitrator under the Antarctic Environment Protocol. In addition, he is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations and the American Society of International Law.
